

# Tuesday, July 29, 2025

# Call To Order – Chris Craig, FDOT Central Office

The meeting was called to order at 1:00 PM by Chris Craig. He provided a recap of our last meeting, noted the creation of the new E-bike focus group, shared highlights from the agenda, and welcomed new members.

# Meeting Dedication in Honor of Francis "Frank" Rebar – Angela Kristiansen, Kittelson (see Appendix B for slides)

The meeting was dedicated to Frank Rebar, who lost his life while crossing the street in Ormond Beach in 2017. Frank was a NASA engineer who led part of the Hubble telescope, a Navy veteran, and fond of joking that he wasn't "old enough to play golf". His wife Barbara, and daughter Joyce (FDOT District 5), were invited to share memories and celebrate him as a father, husband, and active community member.

### Coalition Members Introductions – All Attendees

Coalition members and guests briefly introduced themselves, sharing their organization and role.

Announcements – Alicia Galloway, Chris Craig, FDOT Central Office; Melissa Wandall, National Coalition for Safer Roads

Alicia reviewed logistics for travel arrangements, parking, and dinner.

Chris discussed upcoming changes to the <u>Ped Bike Safety Resource Center</u>. The Florida Traffic Safety Resource Center will serve as a one-stop-shop for all FDOT traffic safety materials. The site will be searchable by age, language, topics, and will also have a feature for requesting an affiliate agency logo to be placed on materials. The anticipated launch is September 1, 2025. The Ped Bike Resource Center will be slowly decommissioned after that, and materials will migrate over to the new FTSRC. Paul Simpson shared that funding for bicycle helmets will resume in October.

Melissa Wandall briefed the group on Stop on Red Week (August 3-9) and requested that members share the National Coalition for Safer Roads website and social media campaigns.

# District Spotlight – Loreen Bobo, FDOT District Five (see Appendix B for slides)

Loreen shared the following updates on activities in District Five:

- Me Strong 5K, February 1, 2025 FDOT D5 sponsored and tabled
- Florida Bicycle Month Pi Day Event, March 14, 2025
- Efforts to Get to Zero:
  - Digital SR 60 Safety Messages via geofencing reached 3.5 million people and can be used on any roadway
  - Move Over Gas Pump Views
- Smart Driving College Challenge Universities in Volusia competed and signed up for an app
- Sponsored April 12 Transportation Safety Night with the Daytona Tortugas Minor League Baseball Team
- The "Safety Second" is safety messaging that goes out to all D5 employees on the second day of each month

- Second Annual Central Florida Safety Summit at Daytona International Speedway partnering with Safe Teen Driving effort
  - Dedication to First Steps Shelter Residents (Volusia County)
  - An intersection safety improvement project and Walkwise safe pedestrian course that
     FDOT District Five developed for the residents of First Steps Shelter
- Keep a Coin, Give a Coin and the District 5 Starfish
- Infrastructure Projects:
  - Conway Road Safety Improvements
  - o Intersection Improvements for U.S. 1 and Cidco Road
  - State Road 200 PHBs
- High Visibility Enforcement (HVE) has been very effective; enforcement feedback highlighted needs like fixing or replacing bike/ped infrastructure, refreshed crosswalks
- Operation Southern Slowdown 20 law enforcement partners, largest attendance since launch
- National Stop on Red Week August 3-9
- Comments:
  - o Suggestion to partner with Matthew's Hope new sleeping bus program in Cocoa

# Micromobility Success! - Angela Kristiansen, Megan Mello, Kittelson (see Appendix B for slides)

Angela shared that the Micromobility Model Legislation drafted by the Ped Bike Safety Coalition has been adopted into Florida statute, updating the statutory definition of "micromobility devices." Members participated in an interactive quiz to test their memory and knowledge of the definition. The coalition team also took this time to celebrate and thank former Statewide Ped/Bike Champion, L.K. Nandam, for his dedication to the coalition. L.K. was instrumental in the micromobility legislation, and supported many changes in FDOT policy to promote safety for people walking and biking.

### 2025 Legislative Updates - Chief Brett Railey, IPTM (see Appendix B for slides)

Chief Railey presented an overview of the legislative updates that were passed in the 2025 Florida Legislative session.

#### Comments:

- Emmeth noted how micromobility ordinances could differ between jurisdictions, and asked if a framework should be provided to localities with minimum and consistent standards. Chief Railey stated that from an enforcement opinion, it's best to defer to local governments to write and enforce regulations. State statutes could be updated if this approach doesn't work well.
- Mighk Wilson suggested that the ID requirement in the language might be able to enforce an education component.
- Laura Hardwicke suggested that the state might benefit from partnering with jurisdictions with frequent border changes between local, county, and state lines to have consistent signing and messaging. Chief Railey agreed uniformity is a good idea, but until then a patchwork approach will be in place.
- Emily Bush suggested that the coalition could prepare draft policy language for local ordinances or future updates to Florida Statute model language.
- DeWayne Carver suggested that any new policy suggestions be run past Law Enforcement to for their thoughts and/or input.

# The Power of Why – Melissa Wandall, National Coalition for Safer Roads (see Appendix B for slides)

Melissa shared her personal story of loss and how it has become the "why" behind her work to drive down traffic fatalities. She asked coalition members to think about their own "whys" and to use their power to motivate their work.

# Implementation Plan Updates – Megan Mello, Kittelson

Megan shared team progress and introduced the agenda for breakout sessions.

# Breakout Session: Emphasis Area Implementation Plans and Priorities

Emphasis area teams met to discuss their respective implementation plans. The E-bike Focus group also met during this time.

# Regroup: Collaboration Needs – Coalition Team, Goal Leaders

The emphasis area teams reported back on who they need to meet during breakout sessions on Day 2.

### Public Comment Period

Emily shared an announcement about Bike/Walk Central Florida's upcoming events.

# Day 1 Wrap Up

Angela encouraged members to provide comments on the draft "Three-Foot" graphics, shared details of the group dinner, and previewed the pedestrian point-of-view activity planned for the next day.

# Wednesday, July 30, 2025

### Coffee Talk – All Attendees

As coalition members arrived, they were encouraged to provide comments on graphics related to Florida's three-foot law for passing bikes.

# Call to Order – Chris Craig, FDOT

The meeting was called to order at 8:15 AM by Chris Craig.

# Pedestrian Point-of-View Experience – All Attendees (see Appendix B for slides)

Coalition members were split into four groups to experience walking from a visually-impaired, mobility-impaired, and child point of view. Megan Mello briefed the coalition on the activity. The visually-impaired station provided an overview of three types of tactile walking surface indicators. The mobility-impaired station had members travel along the sidewalk using a variety of wheeled items, to simulate what it's like to rely on curb ramps and clear pedestrian access routes. The child station had members cross the street using a reverse periscope, which simulated what it is like to be at the height of a child (or a wheelchair user or someone below average adult height).

# Pedestrian Point-of-View Experience Debrief – Megan Mello, Kittelson (see Appendix B for slides)

The team reconvened and discussed their experiences. Someone noted that this exercise highlighted the importance of agencies to collaborate and integrate Bike/Ped POV into projects proactively rather than retroactively as special projects.

### Visually-Impaired Point-of-View

- Tactile warning delineators (TWD) could be helpful in planning shared facilities used by both pedestrians and different forms of micromobility
- Consistency is needed among state and local agencies on how to apply tactile devices
- Crossing guards also use truncated domes as visual cues or "stand back line" for kids

#### Mobility-Impaired Point-of-View

- Participants shared that slopes are steeper than standard, especially cross slopes. This was experienced more when rolling than walking
- Participants noted that the wider sidewalks were more comfortable when using mobility devices
- Mobility needs include more than wheelchairs (e.g. strollers, temporary aids like crutches, dollies, wagons, etc.)
- It can be tiring or painful to stand up when using a walker or crutches. Crossings that require diversions from a direct path are difficult. May be better to consider shorter, more direct crossings

### Child Point-of-View

- Members mentioned the reverse periscopes affected their balance (disorienting)
- The visual limitations of the reverse periscopes made it harder to be aware of cars and trucks
- Members had a new appreciation for crossing guards who help to protect children, who have a harder time seeing cars

- One member noted that children are likely to cross at slower speeds, and may require longer crossing phases
- A parent mentioned that when crossing with kids it can be difficult to be fully aware of oncoming traffic

# District Spotlight – Tanya Merkle and Keith Robbins, FDOT District 1 (see Appendix B for slides)

Tanya described several ongoing projects in D1. She also mentioned that D1 is analyzing permissive left turns vs ped bike crashes. District 1 also has a bicycle and pedestrian master plan in the works. This involves mapping all the bike and pedestrian facilities in District 1. This will allow people to see which areas need to be targeted for safety needs. Tanya shared a preliminary map of existing facilities. Tanya highlighted a District 1 campaign in Sarasota to educate drivers to watch before they open doors to prevent dooring collisions between cyclists and people exiting vehicles.

Keith Robbins shared an overview of the District 1 Safety Strategic Plan, which is being written now. The plan focuses on safety culture. Keith highlighted the Operation Safety event, held in February, that introduced young people to the basics of safety on bicycles and as pedestrians interacting with busy streets. He described the Ringling Bridge, which now includes a bus only lane and a bike lane – with a plan to eventually have a grade separated ped/bike facility. There are some new Pedestrian Hybrid Beacons that have been installed in District 1, on segments that used to have high ped and bike crash rates. Now, both bike/ped crashes and vehicle crashes have decreased significantly. Keith also shared about the US 41 Bridge with protected ped facilities and a protected bike lane concept proposed for SR 789.

### Breakout: Collaboration & Work Session

Megan introduced the agenda for the breakout sessions. Emphasis area teams met to discuss their respective implementation plans. Several groups connected across emphasis areas to discuss topics requiring collaboration.

District Champions may support different functional units and have different duties but often serve as one or more of the following:



- SUN Trail Coordinators




